INTRODUCTION

The Thunder Bay Police Service (TBPS) is a single tier municipal Police Service that serves the City of Thunder Bay and the Municipality of Oliver Paipoonge, an area of 678 square kilometers. The recorded population is approximately 117,000. Thunder Bay has the highest municipal population in Northwestern Ontario, and the second highest in all of Northern Ontario (second to Greater Sudbury).



MESSAGE FROM BOARD CHAIR




2023 was a transitional year for the Thunder Bay Police Service Board (Board). Since resuming local control in July 2023, the Board has been diligently working to implement oversight recommendations and build trust with Thunder Bay's diverse communities.

The Board continues to work collaboratively with Thunder Bay's Police Service (Service) to establish Nation to Nation relationships with First Nations Leaders. In 2023, the Service established working partnerships with Indigenous and other service providers in mental health, human trafficking, substance use, and the unhoused.

Since 2023, the Board has developed policies, procedures and organizational structures in the areas of Board Governance, Setting the Direction of the Police Service, and Community Engagement. In total, the Board has implemented 49 recommendations. The Board remains committed to ensuring that Thunder Bay has a strong police oversight system that is trusted by all the diverse communities we serve.

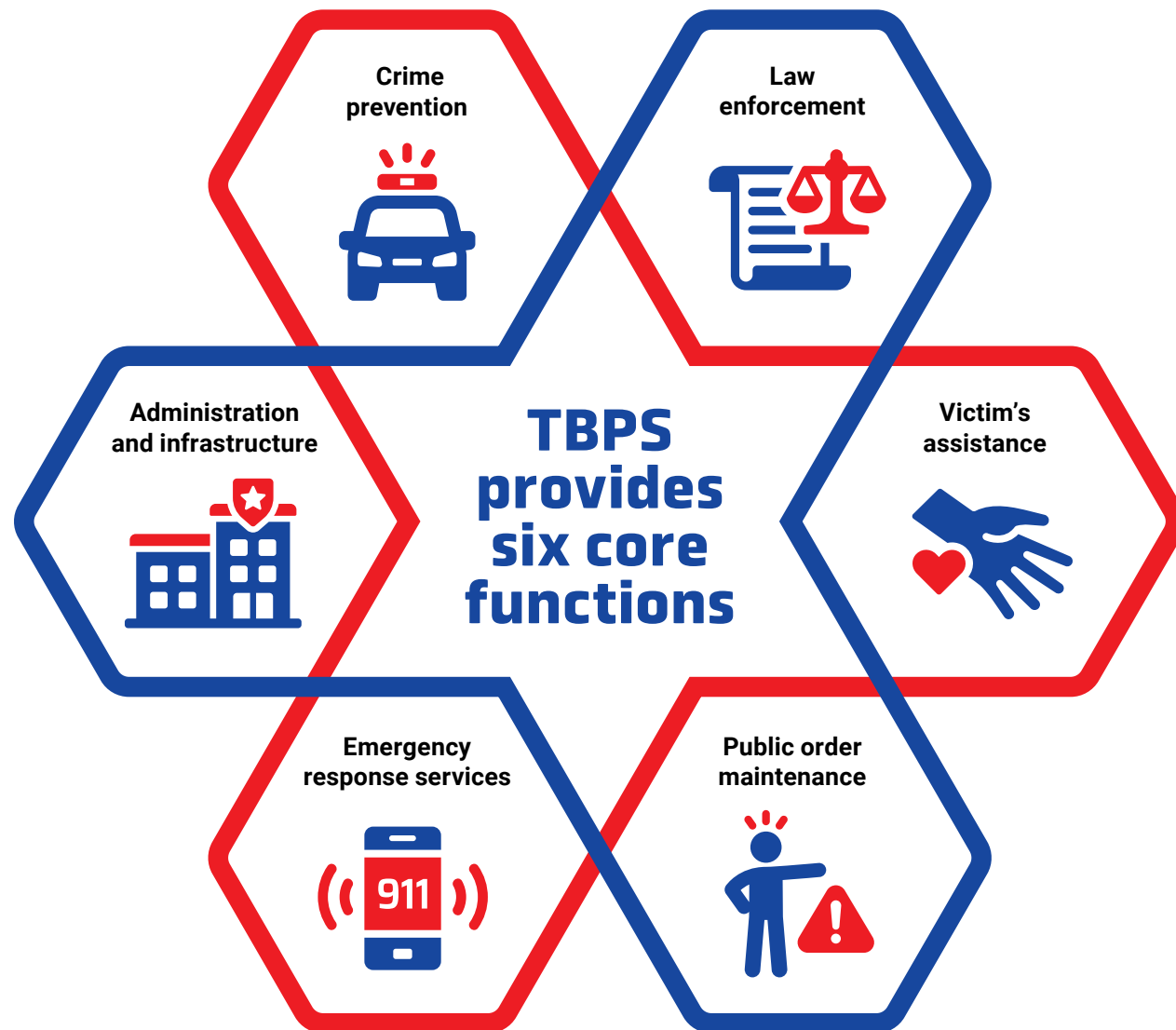

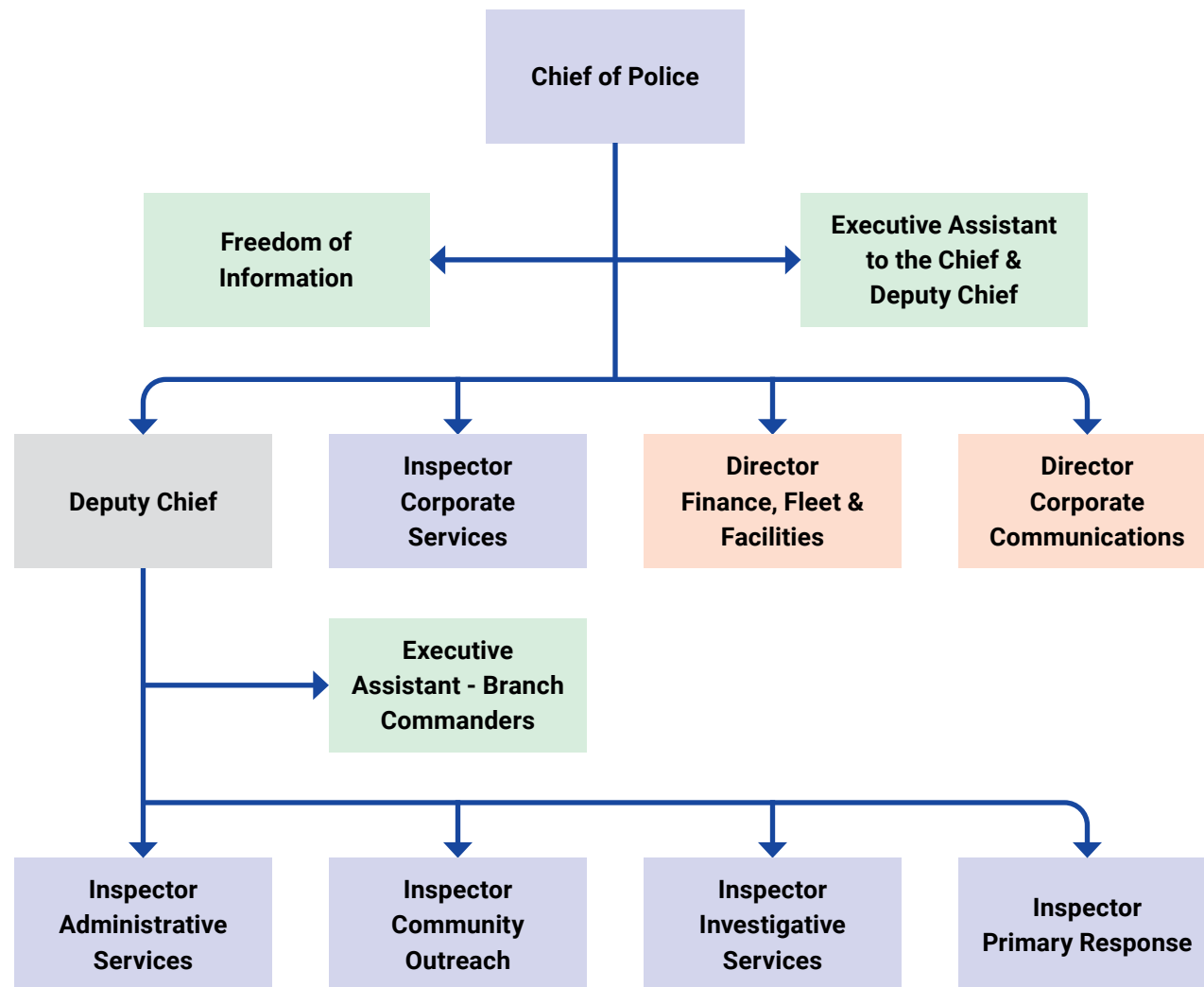

The Change of Command Ceremony concluded the formal transition from Retiring Chief Dan Taddeo to Chief Designate Darcy Fleury. The formal ceremony took place on Monday, May 15, 2023.

Originally from Manitoba, Chief Fleury is a proud Member of Manitoba Metis Federation, where his father was a founding member. Fleury has 36-years of policing experience with the Royal Canadian Mounted Police (RCMP) and was most recently the RCMP District Commander – Chief Superintendent, Central Alberta District based in Edmonton. Fleury brings to the position an extensive experience in investigative, operational, and administrative policing, including leadership at senior and executive levels. His career spans postings in the Northwest Territories, Manitoba, and Alberta.

Shortly after joining the RCMP, Chief Fleury married Carolina and they have two adult daughters, Jessica, and Andrea, and are proud grandparents to Everett James and Scarlett Jane.

Fleury arrived in Thunder Bay on April 17, 2023, and assumed the role of TBPS Chief Designate.

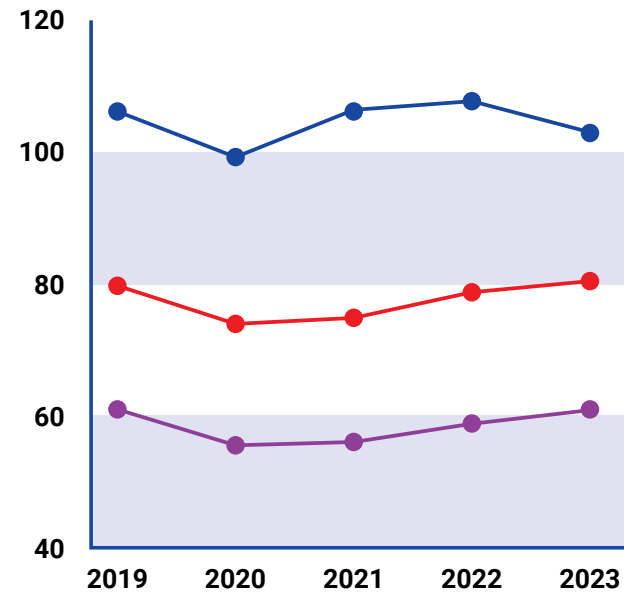

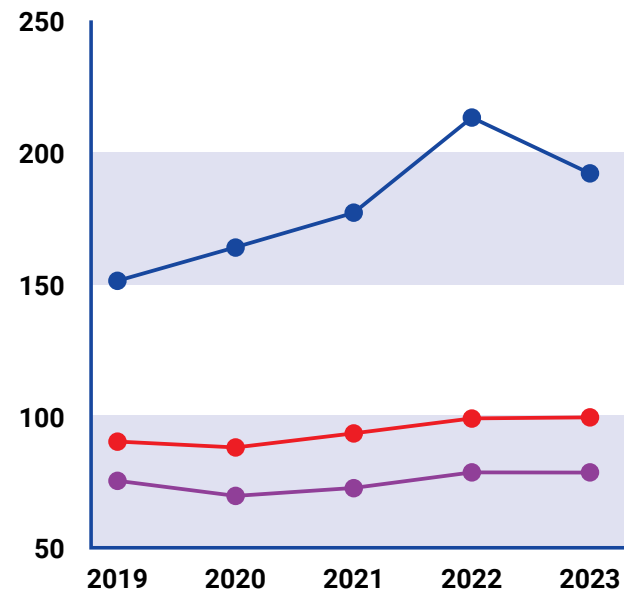

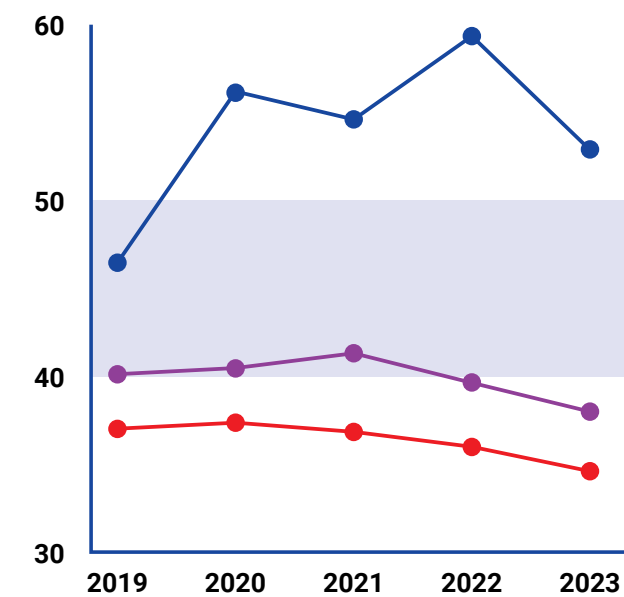
Crime Severity Index



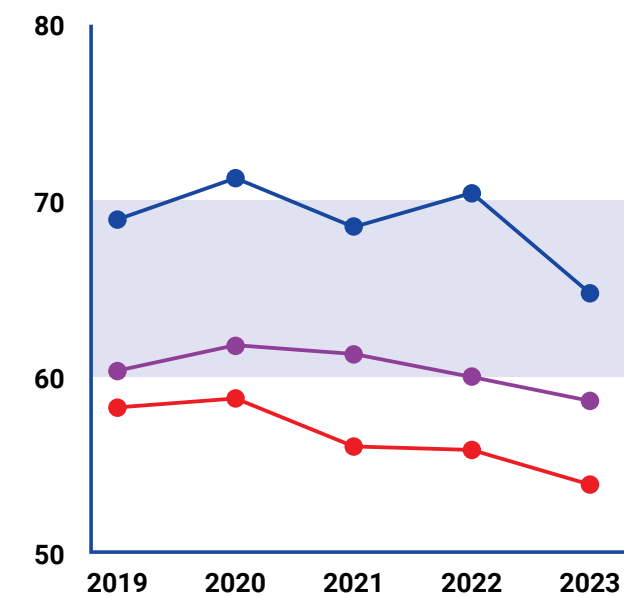
Weighted Clearance Rate
